From the Pastor's Desk...

I usually say, "Spring can't come soon enough," but this year it did. Plenty early. Too early, actually, I still need to get my lawnmower tuned up and prepped and already the lawn is got that scraggly "mow me" look. But the mower's now in the shop, and the repair guy says that it'll be back in 2 to 3 weeks. Though we hope for it, plan for it, long and wait for it, nothing quite prepares us for the surprise and delight of seeing those first buds, the trees as they begin to flower, the crocuses as they bloom.

Up in New York State, at my brother's house over the weekend, there were few signs of life, except for these purple crocus that had come to flower, almost hidden around their yard. They were ready to go, ready to bloom, whether we were or not. Driving south, back to Dayton, it surprised us when we suddenly saw that all the trees had sprouted flowers here, all the bushes and redbuds had blossomed. Just a few minutes north, things were still bare and empty, but here, clearly, Spring had sprung.

Spring is a reminder of New Life. It's no surprise that Easter is celebrated in the Spring-time, as we see resurrection all around us. Other than taking in the flowers and buds, the grass and leaves of the trees, I usually don't think very long or hard about growing things. Well, I didn't until my oldest son became an organic farmer. Now, I know, from watching him work so hard to pull healthy vegetables from the ground, that most of the things that grow require some preparation, some planning, some planting and feeding and fertilizer and water. Jacob has been nurturing seeds into plants in his green house since after the first of the year, getting ready for the growing season when those plants will be moved out into his freshly plowed garden. There will be the long hot summer growing season, and multiple harvests as food is carried to market and to table, but then it will be over in the Fall, and in the cold of winter nature will regroup, preparing for it to start all over again next year. And so we go, around and around.

In his book, "Falling Upward," Richard Rohr speaks of the cyclical nature of life, the spiral path of the spiritual journey, that, if we are doing life well, is constantly expanding and enlarging our perspective, understanding and influence. It comes he says with a deep knowing that is more recognition than any linear cognition or thought. In other words, we don't make up "good ideas" in the abstract, say, about beauty or truth or love, but recognize them when we see them. We've all had those "a ha!" moments, when we've read something, or saw something in a movie or play, and it connected at a deeper level. We felt something real in the moment, and it was as if someone were reading our mind.

In the chapter on how it seems to be true of humanity, that we are made in the image of God, the very daughters and sons of God's own making, and yet we forget, Rohr quotes a poem by William Wordsworth:

Our birth is but a sleep and a forgetting:
The Soul that rises with us, our Life's Star
Hath had elsewhere its setting,
And cometh from afar:
Not in entire forgetfulness.
And not in utter nakedness,
But trailing clouds of glory do we come
From God, who is our home:
Heaven lies about us in our infancy!
Shades of the prison-house begin to close upon the growing boy (and girl)
But (s)he beholds the light, and whence it flows,
(S)He sees it in his(her) joy.

Rohr writes that "Mature religion is always trying to get you out of the closing prison-house of the false self." Rohr notes, "The false self is your role, title, and personal image that is largely a creation of your own mind and attachments."

He says, we start in God, at our birth our Soul is "our Life's Star," and then as life piles on we lose our way, we forget who and whose we are. If we're not careful, as we grow we find ourselves trapped in the "shades of the prison-house" rather than living fully in the light, where life flows and we know the joy that God is our true home.

But we have to journey away from our home, so that we can return to it, as if seeing it, knowing it for the first time. That is, we can't truly appreciate the coming Spring, not having known its winter. We often fail to take the gift of life and love seriously, suggests Rohr, until we have learned something of human frailty, sickness and death, or been let down by one we love or fallen down on our own. But, says Rohr, God has given us an inner longing, a homing device, or as Augustine said, "we are restless till we find our rest in God."

Rohr said it this way, "We are created with an inner restlessness and call that urges us on to the risks and promises of a second half to our life. There is a God-sized hole in all of us, waiting to be filled. God creates the very dissatisfaction that only grace and finally divine love can satisfy."

We have known winter. This year it was a light one, maybe next year it won't be. We have also known the dark night of the soul, faced loneliness, dis-ease and disappointment, anxiety and doubt, if we can dare be honest. And Spring has come again, inviting us out into the light and warmth of day, to live again, anew, to make a fresh start. Resurrection invites us to new ways of living and being, to plant seeds for good and promising things to grow, so that we can live in wholeness, truth and beauty, kindness and love.

All this while extending love to all, even to the point of vulnerability with one another. Not an easy task, but certainly one in which I am excited to be engaged. One of the ways in which we here in the Dayton area can help raise awareness, can provoke one another, is to be part of the Good Friday Walk for Justice and Peace. This annual event, sponsored by a number of Miami Valley organizations that work for justice, is a walk through the Stations of the Cross, with each stop representing an area of justice, in downtown Dayton. If you're interested in joining this walk, I will leave the church about 11:30 on Friday, April 6th. Or, you can get to Courthouse Square before noon and join the walk there.



"Re-Claiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World" Book Study with Pastor Brian on Mondays after Easter

Dr. Newcomb will be offering a book study around the latest tome from Bishop John Shelby Spong, "Re-Claiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World" (HarperOne), starting Monday, April 9, at 7:00 p.m. in the Conference Room. While almost all Christians say that the Bible is the primary witness and authority in the life of the Church, some refer to it as God's Word. Yet many of us have trouble actually reading it. Whether it's the fact that it's an ancient text, written in two "dead" languages for people and faith communities in a world long gone, or that some of our neighbors have stripped quotes from the Bible's original context to use it as a blunt instrument in arguments and theological debates about everything from the origins of the earth and humanity, to the meaning and purpose of the life of Jesus, and how we are to be and act as people of faith today, many of us find the Bible inaccessible and beyond understanding.



In the UCC, we sometimes say "we take the Bible seriously, but not literally," but if we're honest, many of us don't quite know what to make of the Bible. Some parts are reassuring, poetic and beautiful, other parts feel strange, violent and difficult at best. The book's jacket suggests that, "reaching beyond the familiar Sunday-school stories that have provided the content for most people's biblical knowledge, Spong's journey into the heart of the Bible is his attempt to call his readers into their own journeys into the mystery of God. 'One does not,' he asserts, 'have to twist one's brain into a first-century pretzel in order to take the Bible seriously in this increasingly non-religious world.'"

The book "explores the origin and essential meaning of each of the individual books in the Bible, examining the background, the context, the level of authenticity and even the trustworthiness of the messages found there... he explains why these particular books, written between two and three thousand years ago, came to be regarded as authoritative and preserved as sacred."

If you plan to attend, we invite you to arrange to get a copy of the book, and then read the assigned pages before we gather. Our 90-minute classes will give us a chance to ask questions, discuss the book's strengths and weaknesses and enter into thoughtful dialogue. Here is the class & reading schedule:

April 9 – The Preface and Parts I & II; Setting the Stage: Posing the Problem, and The Formation of the Torah

April 16 – Parts III & IV; The Rise of the Prophets, and Introducing the Writing Prophets

April 23 – Parts V & VI; The Minor Prophets: The Book of the Twelve, and The Bible's Protest Literature (Job & Ruth)

April 30 – Parts VII & VIII; Liturgical Books & Wisdom Literature, and Introducing the Christian Scriptures, Commonly Called the New Testament

May 7 – Part IX (Chaps. 31 – 40); Paul: The First New Testament Writer

May 21 – Chap. 41 (of Part IX) – Chap. 49 (of Part X); Post-Pauline Epistles, and The Synoptic Gospels (Mark, Matthew & Luke)

June 4 – Chap. 50 (Part X) – Part XI; Acts and The Pastoral Epistles, Hebrews and the General Epistles June 11 – Part XII; The Johannine Corpus

David's United Church of Christ, in Kettering Ohio will host a special, intimate acoustic concert by Derri Daugherty and Steve Hindalong of the alternative Christian rock band, The Choir Doors open at 6:15 p.m. Tickets: \$10

In recent years, Steve Hindalong and Derri Daugherty, the principal creative core of the veteran band, The Choir has been taking the music of their long and prolific career out to intimate settings for house concerts and the like, performing many of their fans favorites re-visioned for more acoustic settings. On the 25th anniversary of their classic album, "Chase the Kangaroo," they are promising to play that record in its entirety, along with career favorites, songs from last year's release "Burning Like the Midnight Sun" and a few from a new album coming out later in 2012.

One of a handful of alternative Christian rock bands that matter, The Choir was a seminal influence on bands that sought to sing about their faith in ways that touched the larger culture in meaningful ways, through relevant, creative music that really rocked and artful, lyrical imagery. Daugherty delivered the bright, effected guitar cadences that ring out, and gave sweet, soulful voice to the lyrics written by drummer Hindalong. If you've never heard The Choir, you will benefit from visiting their website: http://www.thechoir.net. Now in their fourth decade, The Choir has taken their music (often supported by bassist Tim Chandler, and Buckeye Dan Michaels on sax & lyricon) to school auditoriums, church basements, gritty nightclubs and major Christian rock festivals.

Often contemporary Christian music songs sound theologically shallow and preachy. The Choir stands apart from that apt criticism, by writing about God's grace, mercy and love from broad personal experiences. As they sang on their last album, "The word inside the Word is love." Or as they reflected on the upside down world of cartoon reality and looked for images of the One Great Mystery: "Shovel go deep, heart be true, chase the kangaroo."

While the relaxed, acoustic setting will work for older Choir fans, and baby boomers who still enjoy melodic folk/rock, The Choir's mix of drums and guitars, rich songwriting and relevant reflections will make them a fun evening for those new to their music, from high school on up. Needless to say (but we will), we're gathering for a night of music among friends, old and new, there will be no additional sermon or offering, just an evening with Derri & Steve, and a "Kangaroo."
