

From the Pastor's Desk...

There's a line from one of my favorite songs, by one of my favorite songwriters that has been running through my brain a lot lately...

(The song is "Thing Called Love," by John Hiatt, which was turned into a radio hit by Bonnie Raitt. Susan & I have purchased tix to see Ms. Raitt around our 25th anniversary celebration, and this song has long been a favorite of ours, from Hiatt's wonderful "Bring the Family" album. If you're inclined toward the internets, there's a wonderful youtube version of the song that you may want to check out, sung by Hiatt and Lyle Lovett with the band from David Letterman's Late Night t.v. show.)

...and it goes this way: "We can live in fear or act out of hope / For some kind of peaceful situation / Baby, how come the cry of love is so alarming? Are you ready for this thing called love?"

Now, generally speaking, I know that life is more complex, challenging and difficult than some simple binary either/or response would tend to suggest. Most of the time, the solutions to our problems are not this or that, at the either/or extremes, but can be found in the middle ground amid compromise and conversation. Given the chance, I often want to look for a "both/and" solution to some of the more perplexing "either/or" divisions.

You've no doubt heard it said that there are two kinds of people in the world: those who think there are two kinds of people in the world and those who don't. And while most of the time I'd have to say that there are many more than two kinds of people in the world than two (no matter how funny a joke this premise is designed to set up), more often recently I've begun to think that perhaps there are, broadly speaking of course, two very different approaches to life.

As John Hiatt said, "We can live in fear or act out of hope."

Perhaps that's what Moses was suggesting in Deuteronomy, when he said that God has set before humankind two paths, one that leads to life and one that leads to death. So, Moses told his people, "choose life." For Moses' people, the path that led to life was one rooted and grounded in love, a relationship of trust and reliance on God that found them embracing the wisdom of God's teachings. These teachings included an affirmation of Sabbath rest, respect for one another and one another's families and properties, and keeping one's trust on God and not other false deities.

Jesus encapsulated those same thoughts when he declared that "I have come that you might have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). When Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life," he was inviting us to walk in the way of faith, hope and love. Just as the Hebrew Bible repeatedly tells folk to "Fret not," Jesus reminds his followers to "not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

In Jesus' vision for his followers it's as if he expects that our love and trust of God would be so liberating and freeing that we could then whole heartedly love the world. Free of worries and no longer dominated by profound self-interest, we would be liberated to tend to the world's needs, and the people around us. In essence, we would stop living in fear and learn to act out of hope.

As individuals, as families, as a congregation, as a nation/society, it might be helpful to consider how often have we reacted to life and its diverse challenges because we are fearful and anxious, and how often we have acted faithfully on behalf of others, confident of God's graceful and sustaining love, as well as the support of one another in the larger community of faith?

It's something to think about, what guides our decisions, what motivates us to act, fear or hope? Are we driven by worry and self-interest or the call to love and shape a better, more compassionate and just society? Given the opportunity, are we ready for this thing called love – love of God who invites us to 'fret not,' and live out an alternative vision of success and fulfillment that is rooted in service and sacrifice on behalf of others, and loving our neighbors as our selves?

Often at David's Church and in our individual lives we give witness to this call to love and serve. While we do at times worry about the future, this situation and that, let us also strive to trust God more fully and move to act not from negative motivations but out of hope and longing for a better world, for ourselves, for our children and grand-children. Let us pray, for each other and for the church, that faith, hope and love would be our center, and the greatest of these, love.

Notes from Rev. Daria

Whew! What a whirlwind of a summer! It's often said that church activity slows down during the summer months, giving pastors and parishioners alike the opportunity to enjoy a more relaxed pace, catch up on some reading, and perhaps even get ahead on planning for the fall round of worship services and events. Here at David's, that's just not true. While the activities may be different, the pace remains steady and strong. As I write this, I am just back from what seems like a year away from the building. Of course, it's really only been about 3 weeks that I've been out with youth trips and vacation.

As you know, the Pilgrimage went swimmingly as our 6 youth learned more about the social justice, service, spiritual, and cultural aspects of Memphis & St. Louis. My bus vacation with 40 people from the Cleveland area, many of them members of my former congregation, took me from Hershey & Lancaster, PA to New York City to New Haven to Boston to Lexington & Concord to Salem to Plymouth to Cape Cod to Providence. Our intent was to learn more about the colonial roots of our denomination. It was an insanely-paced but fascinating journey! Then, I had a day to do laundry before taking 6 of our youth to the UCC National Youth Event at Purdue University. We experienced some amazing worship services, heard a round of inspiring motivational speakers (I think everyone's favorite was M.K. Asante, who said, "If you make an observation, you have an obligation"), attended workshops on a wide range of topics including the gospel in Harry Potter, hula dance, cluster bombs, interfaith youth groups, and inclusion of transgendered people in church settings, and had the chance to rock out with performances by Christian spoken word and hip hop artists. Best of all, our youth got to mix with 2,500 kids from UCC churches across the country, including youth from the other churches which traveled with us. We spent time getting to know youth from three Cincinnati churches (First College Hill, Camp Washington, and a brand-new church start) and Cross Creek in Centerville.

The kids came back really jazzed about doing things together, so I've been busy planning activities for the coming year, from our kick-off pool party at the home of the Porters, to be held September 2nd following worship, to preliminary research on next summer's Senior High mission trip! In addition to looking at the coming year in youth group, I have begun to plan for 2012-2013 Confirmation activities. If you have a young person 7th grade or up in your life who is interested in beginning our two-year Confirmation program, please contact me for more information. Planning is underway for our annual retreat and for our parents' meeting, which will be held in the sanctuary following worship on Sunday, September 16th.

Women Exploring Faith, Family at Five, and Spiritual Parenting will all resume normal activities in September, but the Women's Spirituality Group will meet August 27th at 6:30 p.m. in the Conference Room. All women, David's members or friends from other denominations & faiths, are welcome! We will discuss the July and August portions of Sarah Ban Breathnach's *Simple Abundance* and share about our Sabbath practices.

If you'd like to talk about ideas for the coming church year, hear more about youth trips or my vacation, or just chat, I would be happy to see you at Coffee Shop Hours August Wednesdays from 3-5 p.m. at the Washington Square Boston Stoker! If you are already missing your college student who is leaving, I can offer sympathy and a shoulder, as my oldest, Scot, is starting college this fall, planning to major in special education. I would love to have addresses for all our David's college students so we can send notes of encouragement and care packages to help them get through the time away! Please send them either to Chris Wood or to me.

Fall Book Study with Rev. Newcomb

Pastor Brian would like to offer a book study around the latest offering from Diana Butler Bass, “Christianity After Religion; The End of the Church and the Birth of a New Spiritual Awakening” (HarperOne, 2012). Organized religious expressions, she writes, have experienced a “crisis of legitimacy,” and thus we’ve seen declines across the board, both in mainline expressions like the UCC and in more conservative, evangelical megachurches, declines in attendance, financial support and relevance.

Butler Bass suggests that past failures and future spiritual awakenings are rooted in questions of belief, behavior and belonging. As we who are part of a community of faith strive to cut against the grain of an ever more secularized cultural expression, she advises us to prepare, practice, play and participate, thus opening ourselves to the possibility of the next new thing that God’s Spirit is birthing among us.

Unless there is strong interest in another night, we’ll start gathering on Monday night’s at 7 pm, the first class on Sept. 10, meeting 6 – 8 times, depending on how quickly folk want to read it, and how engaged folk are in discussing her material. Please contact Rev. Newcomb to let him know if you intend to join class and are purchasing the book, or have any questions about the class. He hopes for folk to have read the first two chapters and come prepared to discuss them the first night, Monday, Sept. 10.

Choir Singers & Ringers of All Ages Needed!

It’s beginning to look a lot like choir time! We are in need of singers and ringers of all ages! Here at David’s we have a chancel choir, adult handbell choir (high school students welcomed), children’s choir, and children’s handbell choir. As you know the times for practice are:

- Handbell Choir (open to high school students through adult): Thursdays from 6:00 – 7:00 p.m.
- Chancel Choir (open to high school students through adult): Thursdays from 7:30 – 9:00 p.m.
- Children’s Choir: grades kindergarten through sixth grade: Sundays following the second service
- Children’s Bell Choir: Sundays following Children’s Choir

The Thursday adult handbell begin on August 23rd to prepare for the first service of the season on September 9th. We have been blessed with a fantastic set of Malmark bells and handchimes. I am having them overhauled and polished to begin the new choir season. So many churches that I have talked to would love to be able to have them but can’t afford them. Other churches had to reduce their budgets, so they eliminated the handbell choir director, thus eliminating the bell choir. I attended a conference for church musicians in Green Lake, Wisconsin and played in the Intermediate Bell Choir. Playing bells is so much fun and the fellowship is rewarding as well. The most important point is that we play from our hearts to the glory of God. We aren’t always note perfect, but we give every performance our best. We have several positions open, and we are going to be intentional about seeking other people to ring. Please consider ringing with us.

Adult choir (high school students are welcomed with open arms) will begin on the 23rd of August as well. Many of you have told me that choir anthems enrich the worship service immensely, yet you are reluctant to join to help make music. I will help anyone who needs it anytime. We will do whatever it takes to help you sing with us. We are providing a childcare service and will continue as long as we have families with youngsters. We do not want you to have any obstacles keeping you from joining us. The church music conference that I attended this summer was outstanding and the adult sessions were led by Pepper Choplin, the composer who wrote “Night of the Father’s Love,” the cantata we sang last Christmas. Making music with him as the director was so exciting. We ended the week with a concert of seven songs that were very inspirational. I would like our congregation to be thoroughly blessed by the music they hear. You can help make that happen! Don’t hide your gifts under a bushel – they lose something kind of crucial! Come join us and sing praise every Sunday.

The Sunday rehearsals will begin on September 16th for the Children’s Choir and Children’s Handbell Choir. I would like to see the Children’s Choir really grow this year. Children are our hope for the future and 15 minutes on Sunday morning after the service is just not going to get us to learn new music as well as get to know each other better. I am contemplating a different time on Sundays, or maybe a different day. We will have to get everyone together to decide on a time that will work for all. What we will need is commitment from both your child and you to get them to choir. We will make memories to last throughout the years. I could certainly use a choir “mother” or “father” to help with many different tasks. All I ask is that the person is willing to give their all to help for the time that we schedule the choir.

Our church could use revitalization, and we are the ones to make it happen. We know how important our church is here at David’s, and together we will make glorious music.

I am really looking forward to great choir seasons, but we need YOU to make it happen! Please consider giving back by joining one or more of the groups.
