

From the Pastor's Desk...

You've probably heard me joke that being a pastor & teacher in the modern church is a lot like herding cats. That's only funny until you have to get the cats together to make a decision or embrace a new path or direction, then it can be a bit exhausting.

As you might guess, the nature of leadership in the church has evolved and changed over the decades, creating a sense of dis-ease and uncertainty among professional clergy and elected lay leaders about how best to lead, the most effective path to garner congregational support and buy in to programs.

One might imagine that this lack of clarity can be especially difficult to navigate when a congregation is weathering a massive transition like a pastoral vacancy or considering a visioning process like the one associated with the Open & Affirming process and the Covenant of Welcome statement. So, let me share a few words about leadership in the church today, from a personal perspective based on insights from a number of resources I've tapped on the subject.

I doubt that leadership has ever been "easy," but certainly there was a time in the not so distant past where it was less complicated than it is today. Certainly, family life in America never actually mirrored the life on the '50's TV series "Father Knows Best," but we have a sense of a simpler time, less intrusions, less complications, certainly less technology. Without all the alternatives, and with a social structure that supported church participation as a community norm, successful suburban congregations learned that if they knew how to shape a solid worship hour, had some programming for children and youth, they would very likely see growth.

In that previous era, pastors, mostly men, benefitted from a level of cultural respect and consideration that no longer exists in most places. Leadership often involved technical problems, which required gaining knowledge and aptly applying it. Name the problem and there was always an answer, a fix. Often it was presumed that if something worked in one setting it would work in every setting, so all you had to do was acquire the skill, apply the technique, and the problem would be solved. Need more youth, have a week-long VBS. Need to raise funds, throw a chicken dinner and the community would come out and support it. Write a decent sermon, have a solid choir, give the kids a good Sunday School experience, and families would come to church. It often appeared to many that it was just that simple.

I don't think I need to go into detail enumerating the changes of the last 60 years and the challenges they represent in the life of a modern day, mainline Protestant church like ours here at David's, but we can all agree that in many and profound ways, "times have changed." We may wish for the good old days, we may long for older, simpler times, but that emotion and \$2 will get you a cup of coffee at Starbucks, where I hear they do a steady business on Sunday mornings even though many churches do not. (And do you remember a \$.39 cup of coffee?)

In his book "Transforming Congregational Culture," Anthony B. Robinson summarizes the challenges congregations like David's face at the end of his first chapter: "Others have pointed to other factors in the cultural change: demographic shifts from the east to the west, declining birth rates among the mainline, and a shifting financial base, among others. But **these five** – from **obligation to motivation**, the **breakdown of social trust and reliable authority**, new immigration and **religious pluralism**, the **Protestant main line's stifling embrace of modernity**, and simple **complacency** on the part of the Protestant mainline – seem to me to be the most salient shifts in American culture and its religious ethos that have spelled decline for the mainline Protestant churches."

Robinson goes on in that book's second chapter to borrow from the learnings of Ronald Heifetz, author of "Leadership Without Easy Answers," to address some of the internal challenges to life and leadership in the church of the modern era. Heifetz makes an important distinction between "technical work" and an "adaptive challenge." Problem solving in that previous era was often technical work; if one could clearly define the problem; there was often an obvious and clear solution. Fixing a broken arm is a technical problem. The Doctor knows how to set the bone, so that healing and recovery can happen.

In Heifetz's model, the challenges facing the church today are not technical problems, but complex "adaptive challenges," where the solutions are not so clear and requires learning and change; not like a broken bone that needs to be set, but more on the lines of being diagnosed with heart disease, where the suggested solutions are in the vein of lifestyle changes, like more exercise, different diet, reducing stress, etc. Robinson asserts that responding to adaptive challenges is "no simple matter... Learning is required. Change in the internal life, self-perceptions, and culture of a congregation will be necessary if it is to respond to these shifts in the community."

If you think it's hard for an individual to change their lives to be more healthy after a diagnosis of heart disease – giving up red meat and other "bad habits," exercising and losing weight, avoiding some behaviors, adding others – imagine how we might lead a whole congregation, an entire church, to rethink their relationship to faith and the church community, to give up favorite things and take on new challenges and practices. Sound easy? Sound like "herding cats?"

Next month, I'll share some of Robinson's insights into Church leadership in a time of cultural change. In the mean time, I continue to strive to serve as your pastor and friend,

Evolution Sunday, a Time to Thank God for Good Science

Every year for some time now, Rev. Newcomb has participated in Evolution Sunday events on the second Sunday of February, with a host of other clergy coast to coast. With UCC General Minister and President, The Rev. Geoffrey Black, coming to preach on Feb. 12, that won't happen this year. But we want to acknowledge this event and remind you of the letter that started it all.

The Clergy Letter - from American Christian clergy - An Open Letter Concerning Religion and Science

Within the community of Christian believers there are areas of dispute and disagreement, including the proper way to interpret Holy Scripture. While virtually all Christians take the Bible seriously and hold it to be authoritative in matters of faith and practice, the overwhelming majority do not read the Bible literally, as they would a science textbook. Many of the beloved stories found in the Bible – the Creation, Adam and Eve, Noah and the ark – convey timeless truths about God, human beings, and the proper relationship between Creator and creation expressed in the only form capable of transmitting these truths from generation to generation. Religious truth is of a different order from scientific truth. Its purpose is not to convey scientific information but to transform hearts.

We the undersigned, Christian clergy from many different traditions, believe that the timeless truths of the Bible and the discoveries of modern science may comfortably coexist. We believe that the theory of evolution is a foundational scientific truth, one that has stood up to rigorous scrutiny and upon which much of human knowledge and achievement rests. To reject this truth or to treat it as "one theory among others" is to deliberately embrace scientific ignorance and transmit such ignorance to our children. We believe that among God's good gifts are human minds capable of critical thought and that the failure to fully employ this gift is a rejection of the will of our Creator. To argue that God's loving plan of salvation for humanity precludes the full employment of the God-given faculty of reason is to attempt to limit God, an act of hubris. We urge school board members to preserve the integrity of the science curriculum by affirming the teaching of the theory of evolution as a core component of human knowledge. We ask that science remain science and that religion remain religion, two very different, but complementary, forms of truth. Falling Upward; A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life – led by Rev. Dr. Brian Q. Newcomb

Dr. Newcomb will be offering a spirituality workshop drawing heavily on Richard Rohr's latest book, "Falling Upward; A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life." Pastor Brian will be breaking down the lessons from the book into handouts to facilitate the conversation so that you don't have to purchase the book to benefit from our time together, but those who wish to order a copy can find it at Amazon.com. Here's a quote from the book flap: "Drawing on the wisdom of time-honored myths, heroic poems, great thinkers and sacred religious texts, Richard Rohr explores the two halves of life to show that those who have fallen, failed, or "gone down" are the only ones who understand "up"... a journey to give us an understanding of how the heartbreaks, disappointments, and first loves of life are actually stepping stones to the spiritual joys that the second half of life has in store for us."

With assistance from Cody and AJ Wright the 1,451 tickets sold were poured into a huge stainless steel bowl and tossed and stirred to mix thoroughly! Then with AJ standing on his tiptoes while Cody held the bowl high over his head, AJ pulled the winning ticket from the bowl. He handed the ticket to Cody who read Marlene Shook from Vandalia, Ohio as the winner! Marlene is affiliated with Cody's Boy Scout Troop 307.
