

From the Pastor's Desk...

"Here's the world," writes award winning author Frederick Buechner. "Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Don't be afraid."

It's pretty obvious, that being afraid comes pretty naturally to many of us. Some of us worry quite a bit, even when things are going well. But given our recent history – the recent tragedies of the violent attack on the elementary school in Newtown, CT, and this last month's terror bombing in Boston – it would seem that worry is a practical response to the complicated and dangerous world live in.

Fear is one of the survival mechanisms that has allowed us to evolve to this time and place. Often fear is what keeps us from attempting things that are too dangerous and risky. We've all seen young toddlers who have just learned to walk, although some go straight from crawling to running, it seems. They seem to have no fear: they run toward the steps, they reach out for the hot stove, they pick everything up and put it in their mouth, they have no sense that they might fall and hurt themselves in dozens of ways that every mother and father have imagined a thousand times.

We yell to warn them, we put up fences by the stairs, we don't let them near the hot stove, or near the knife drawer. And sometimes these sensible fears keep us safer, more likely to grow to adulthood and maturity.

But fear can also leave us too overwhelmed and insecure to do the things that need to be done. Sometimes the fear of failure might keep us from trying new things, or from living out our true ambitions. Our fear of being hurt again might keep us from meeting new people, might keep us from making new friends or from allowing love into our lives. Fear, unchecked, can leave us incapacitated, living in a shell.

In the Charlie Brown Christmas special, Dr. Lucy offers our hero psychiatric help for the modest price of 5 cents. She suggests, as they say on TV, that admitting that one has a problem is the first step, and then she says if we can name your fears "we can label it." She goes on to ask if he's afraid of cats, and of the stairs. Then she asks, "do you have pantophobia, the fear of everything?" Charlie responds with a resounding "That's it."

Now most of us, have a healthier sense of self-esteem than poor Charlie Brown, who you'll remember "of all the Charlie Browns in the world, you're the Charlie Browniest."

But after hearing about recent shootings in a theatre, a shopping mall, a kids' school, and then a bombing at a large, prestigious public event like the Boston Marathon, it's going to raise all of our anxiety a bit, don't you think? Although Lucy didn't ask Charlie Brown about "agoraphobia," it's not hard to imagine how some folk might become so frightened about how unsafe the world can feel from time to time, that a person becomes too afraid to even leave their house. Or "xenophobia," the fear of others. With people out there in the world so sad, sick or angry that they would plant a bomb or start shooting people at random, it is easy to imagine becoming so afraid of others that you succumbed to racial and ethnic stereotyping, fearing especially people of color, or of a different nationality or religion.

And that's the danger really, when we let fear have too much of a place in our lives. While some fear can teach us caution, or force us to equip ourselves with better skills to overcome obstacles, or gain better understandings to cope with the uncertainties of life, untended and unleashed, fear can become a power in our lives that undoes us. When fear rules our lives and we are consumed with worry it limits us in ways that diminish our capacity for joy, love and peace of heart and mind.

In fact, I've heard a psychologist (someone with better credentials than Dr. Lucy) say, that the opposite of love is not hate as one might expect, but rather fear. The real Dr. explained that love motivates us to move beyond ourselves and into the world, trusting that we would find meaningful engagement and that our presence could be a force for good, that we might leave the world better than we found it. She said, that it is often fear that drives us in the other direction, it's fear that keeps us from reaching out, from taking the risk to engage others in the world. And, hatred, she said, was merely a by-product of that fear.

What's remarkable about our Scriptures is how many times it tells us to "fear not." Over 100 times, in our Bible, we hear those words or words that mean the same thing. At the very beginning of the Bible, in Genesis, God greets the common ancestor in the three great faiths of the Book – Judaism, Christianity, and Islam – with these words: "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield (15:1)." This pattern appears again and again in the Hebrew Bible and also in the New Testament.

In that wonderful passage in John 14 which we read often at funeral, where Jesus is preparing his friends and disciples for his absence, he says to them: "Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid (v. 27)." And Jesus repeats that greeting when he meets the disciples following Easter, telling them to trust God and believe, and to not be overcome by fear. And that's the central purpose in the often scary book that ends the Bible, as well, to encourage the Church at a time of persecution to not lose hope, to not succumb to their fears, but to hold fast: "Do not be afraid; I am the first and the last, and the living one (Rev. 1: 17-18)."

Still, "do not be afraid," is a negative. What's even more remarkable is the number of times the Bible calls people of faith to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your

mind; and your neighbor as yourself (Luke 10: 27).” Jesus and his contemporary Jewish religious leaders all agreed that those two commands expressed the truth and meaning of whole of the Old Testament law given to the Hebrews, and Jesus imparts this New Commandment upon his followers again and again, and again.

So, if fear is the opposite of love, Jesus and the whole of Scripture bears witness that the life of wholeness, salvation and peace, is rooted not in worry, anxiety and fear, but in trust, belonging and loving action and service to others in the world that God has made. My friends, worry, anxiety and fear are natural responses to life and the uncertainty that comes with it, but Jesus seeks to set us free, for faith in God to become the key that lets us out of that self-made prison. As always, let love be our goal, let love be our only law.

And remember, that while sometimes terrible things will happen. Often, far more often, beautiful things are happening too. Perhaps one way to worry less, and to be less controlled by fear, is to strive to notice all the ways and places in nature and people that God keeps showing up and bringing beauty into our world, our very lives.


Book Study with Pastor Brian on Mondays Continues
