From the Pastor's Desk...

November is always a fun month. Before they started putting up Christmas decorations in the stores in mid-September, it used to be the buffer between the Fall festivals of Harvest that culminate in Halloween, and the big activities of Christmas and New Years that launch us into a new cycle. Generally, November begins with All Saints Day, and wraps up in much of our thinking with the big Thanksgiving weekend, which more than food and football, is intended to stir our minds in the direction of gratitude.

Of course, this isn't just any November, it's a big election year – you may have heard something about that. And, this year Daylight Savings was extended all the way to Nov. 4, so the night before we turn our clock's back one hour. Supposedly, we gain an extra hour of sleep, but how many of us just stay up later?

There are a host of events here at David's in November, as well. The Church's Christmas Bazaar runs the weekend of Nov. 2-4, offering all manner of crafts and items to aid in your Christmas preparations, and great lunches of pulled pork and other goodies. You'll want to drop by during sale hours, and plan to buy a meal. On that Sunday, we'll remember all those who have died in the last year, giving thanks for their lives, and dedicating the remembrance funds that have been used throughout the church for special projects.

On the weekend of Nov. 10 & 11, there's the SONKA Fall Business Meeting held at Shiloh UCC in North Dayton on Saturday, and then worship on that Sunday, we have Holy Communion and the second of our evening stewardship campaign cottage meeting dinners at 5 pm.

On Sunday, Nov. 18, we have the Consecration Sunday that wraps up our stewardship campaign with the opportunity for everyone to place their pledge for the coming year into our basket as we continue to ask God's blessing on all that we do to serve God, both with our finances and with all the other resources available to the Church.

Then on Monday night, Nov. 19, it's David's turn to host the Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service, this year marking the 25th anniversary of our cooperation together with our friends at Temple Beth Or, Christ United Methodist, and St. Charles Borromeo Roman Catholic Church. This historic expression of unity between Jews & Christians, Protestants & Catholics, has reached the quarter century mark, a major triumph of inclusivity and grace. That service begins at 7:30, and we invite you to bring an extra jar of Peanut Butter for the Kettering Backpack Program.

And then there's the holiday itself, Thanksgiving. Some of us will no doubt travel, others will have guests from out of town. Some of us will go out on Black Friday and try to get all our Christmas shopping done in one fell swoop, others of us will try and avoid the malls and stores as if trying to avoid bubonic plague.

In essence, we will gather together, as the song says, to ask the Lord's Blessing. For some, the year may have been a good one, marked by obvious signs of good times. For others, there may well have been losses, the passing of loved ones and friends, other challenges and set backs. For most of us, it's likely been far more a mixed bag, because that's the way life comes and living happens, chaotic and unorganized, the good on top of the bad and vice versa. Sometimes life becomes an embarrassment of riches, other times there are struggles that can begin to seem unending.

But there's a lesson in all this. Folk who live each day with gratitude for what's there with them in the present, tend to know more joy in their lives. It's really about perspective, and taking the time to notice the good things that are happening, and pausing to appreciate and value them. Some of us are just wired to be a bit negative, at the end of the day, that's where we focus our attention. Some times, it's just the fast pace of our lives, the clamor of contagious busyness, that distracts us from life's blessings, the good things get over-looked in the haste to meet the next thing on the calendar, we forget to stop and just be in the moment.

In the letter of the Philippians, the Apostle Paul exhorts his friends in faith in the church there to "rejoice in the Lord always... do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." The fruit of those prayers, he writes is "the peace of God which surpasses all understanding." Then he says something that I think makes all that rejoicing, and thanksgiving and surpassing peace possible. Paul writes in 4: 8: "whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think on these things."

So, we don't have to wait for one day a year to be thanksgiving people. When we think on the things in our lives, in our world that are lovely and beautiful and true, the things that make us laugh or cry, the music, the sound of children playing or even arguing, the art of wise conversation, the joke we saved for a special occasion, then we are celebrating our own lives as the gifts of God that they are. We become, we are grateful people.

Pastor Daria does this thing every now and then on her facebook posts where she pauses at the end of the day to make a list of the things that have blest her, usually that list includes an encounter with someone who brought a smile, a meal that was shared, a moment of beauty and grace that might have gone by unnoticed, but because she held onto it, and later wrote it down to be shared, it became a treasure. Maybe some of us will want to start making such a list at the end of our days, or maybe like me, you'll step out into the dark of night at the end of the day to give your dog a chance to chase the

rabbits and mark his territory, and you'll look up and say thanks for all that has come with that day. Either way, let's resolve to notice our lives more closely, and value our loves more attentively, and be grateful, thankful people.

Notes from Rev. Daria

It's nearly November as I write this and I cannot wait to have the election over! One of the things that has been hardest for me, and for many of us, to swallow is the high level of incivility exhibited by candidates, parties, and among the general populace. It sometimes seems to me that we are moving toward being a nation where kindness and manners don't count. I see this not only in political discourse and religious debate, but also in small things like leaving a grocery cart in the middle of the parking lot or treating a worker at McDonald's as if they are not worthy of our best . I know that there are plenty of people left in the world who do mind their manners, but it can be disheartening to bump up against the rudeness and sometimes downright mean behavior others exhibit. I think it's really important for us all to counteract this by being kind and polite. So, whoever wins this election, wherever we stand on the broad political field, let's make a real effort this month, and going into the future, to set aside our differences and seek the commonality that binds us all together. The UCC motto, "That they may all be one," taken from John 17, is one that I hope we can all take to heart this post-election season.

I have a hunch that one of the contributing factors to the escalation of incivility these days is that we are all too busy to slow down and appreciate one another. I recently facilitated a workshop on playful Sabbath and one of the observations we made is that being too busy is almost seen as a badge of merit, a source of bragging rights, in our culture. It's the only one of the 10 commandments we are proud to break. Those of us involved in the Women's Spirituality Group are working hard to create space for sabbath in our lives and supporting one another in this counter-cultural endeavor. If you'd like to join us, we'll meet on Monday, November 26th, at 6:30 p.m. in the Confirmation Room. All women are invited, whatever faith, so feel free to bring a friend. All women are also invited to be part of the discussion of chapter 3, "Waking up with Constantine," in Robin Meyers' *The Underground Church*. We'll meet at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, November 14th, in the Conference Room.

In the same vein, and rather encouragingly, our nation recently has been immersed in a conversation around bullying and how to counteract it. I was very happy, then, to hear at a recent educators' gathering, that there will be a junior high youth event the last weekend in February with a focus on bullying and how to stop it. So, youth in grades 6-8 are encouraged to save the date and communicate interest in the event to me. I hope to have more details soon!

Some details I do have are those around our November Family@5 event, which will be neither on our usual 1st Sunday or at 5. However, it should be a lot of fun! I would like for us to attend together the Kettering Children's Theater production of "The Never-Ending Story," a wonderful, fantastical tale about the importance of imagination. You can make reservations for the 2 p.m. matinee on Sunday, November 11th, by calling 296-0294. Tickets are \$5 for children under 12 and \$7 for adults. Plan to meet in the lobby at the Rosewood Arts Center at 1:30 p.m. and, if you're going, let me know so I can look out for you!

In November, the Confirmation class will watch and discuss the film, "Saved," help serve the Pilgrim's Feast, and discuss the role of Mary in Christianity. I don't have final numbers for the Senior High Fall Youth Event, so I am not sure David's will have representation there this year. If we do not attend, we're going to try a new thing for Senior High Sunday School class. Once or twice a month, we'll have class, led by me, during the worship service. So, if you're a senior high youth and would like to be part of the class, please plan to sit with the other Senior Highs in the rear pews. We'll go out following the children's moment and adjourn to the senior high classroom.

We hope that youth will all plan also to attend worship on the Sundays on which we don't have class. It would be great, too, to have a strong youth showing at the annual Interfaith Service of Thanksgiving, which will be held at David's at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, November 19th. Our faith is formed in many different ways, but regular participation in a service of worship is a key component of faith formation. Also, if you are a youth group member who would like to assume a leadership role in worship, through acting as an usher, liturgist, children's moment leader, or musician, please let me know and we will get you plugged in! I'll be preaching on November 25th and would love to have a youth-studded service!



Elders' Communion Schedule through the Beginning of Next Year


