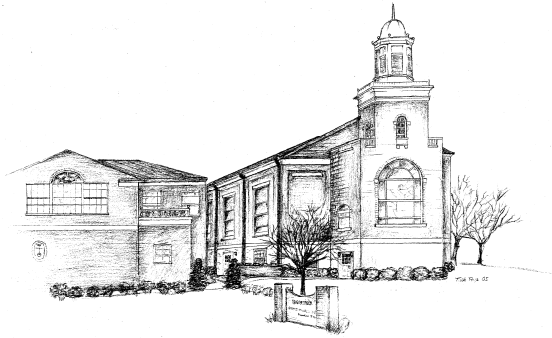

## From the Pastor's Desk...

Well, here we are and it's already November. It feels like it was August just a week ago, and the kids were starting back to school, then just yesterday the leaves started to turn, and suddenly it's November 1<sup>st</sup>, which is All Saint's Sunday. Before you know it tomorrow will be Thanksgiving, and two days later, give or take, it'll be Christmas.

It's easy for November to get pinched, stuck as it is between Halloween and the year's end celebrations – ever notice how Christmas slides right into New Years? We kind of go into a holding pattern after Christmas, waiting it out for the next big party, a week later. At many of the stores we frequent, you can find candy and costumes for Halloween, and right behind them Christmas tree decorations and stockings and suggested gifts.

Every year, I try to hold on to November, not lose sight of what these days suggest, All Saints' Day at the beginning, and Thanksgiving near the end. Last year, giving thanks came easy to me. I had learned in August that I had a tumor on my kidney, in September I had surgery and was told they got all the cancer, that the lymph nodes they had pulled were clean and I was disease-free. So, given a fresh glimpse of my own mortality, every day felt like a gift, I felt opened up to life in new ways. I had a renewed appreciation of the here and now, I wanted to live each moment for all it was worth, didn't want to take a day, a moment, a breath for granted.

But then, as you know, in the Spring I learned that the cancer was back, that surgery was not an option this time, and that my life would now be very different than I had expected. I was given yet another glimpse of my own mortality, and this time I was not going to be allowed to look away so quickly. There would be regular oral chemo treatments, and a host of medications to deal with the side issues and side-effects of the medications, weekly blood tests since I was on blood thinners and blood pressure meds. For a guy who usually got the flu once a year after Christmas, I was now facing a future with challenging disabling realities.

The medicine took away my appetite and ruined the taste of food, so I lost weight and energy, had less strength, and ended up using a wheelchair and eventually a cane to get around since I couldn't rely on my body's strength and resilience as I had in the past. This new sense of vulnerability is humbling, and the daily challenge of meds, diet, exercise, left me with a sense of uncertainty, a sensation that was new to me, and not entirely welcome. I've always prayed, but these new physical challenges left me open and so I often find myself praying – not just for myself, but for everyone and everything that I would encounter during the day. Someone would ask for prayers on Facebook about a medical situation far removed from my own life and experience, and I would pray.

I always prayed for the folk on our church prayer chain, but I have found myself praying for those folk and the members of our congregation even more often, sometimes without realizing that's what I was doing. I'd just remember someone who was in the hospital, or going through a particularly hard time, and I would ask God to be with the person, to be in that situation to bring healing, recovery and wholeness to those folk.

These last months, reading has been difficult, my mind wanders too quickly from the page, but lately it's been getting easier to focus. I'm currently reading three books at once, and that may also be a part of the problem I'm having with the issue of focus. However, one of these is Nadia Bolz-Weber's "Accidental Saints; Finding God in All the Wrong People." Bolz-Weber is the tattooed, punk rock looking, ordained Evangelical Lutheran clergy woman and founding pastor of House for All Sinners and Saints in Denver, Colorado. She is often photographed wearing a traditional clergy shirt with collar, but with her sleeves cut off so you can see her tats.

In "Accidental Saints," she explores the human side of folk who are often thought of as heroes of the faith, because of their accomplishments, their presumed great faith and acts of kindness. Turns out even the most saintly, still turn out to be sinners; and some of the most repugnant sinners still prove in the end to be saints. When she first learned about Alma White, founder of the Pillar of Fire Church in 1901, Bolz-Weber was prepared to celebrate the woman as a hero and role-model, as there weren't that many women like her who had started their own churches, and White had done so over a hundred years earlier.

A quick Google search and she learned that White was the first female Bishop in America, and a noted feminist, things that Bolz-Weber was thrilled to celebrate. But there was more. Turns out White was also associated with the Ku Klux Klan, and expressed views that were anti-Catholic, anti-Semitic, racist and antagonist to immigrants. Could this woman be a "saint" and be racist? When a friend suggested they add

White's name to the litany of saints for All Saints' Sunday, she writes, "I am faced with sticky ambiguities around saints who were bad and sinners who were good."

Ultimately, Bolz-Weber concludes "that what makes us the saints of God is not our ability to be saintly but rather God's ability to work through sinners. The title "saint" is always conferred, never earned... I have come to realize that all the saints I've known have been accidental ones—people who inadvertently stumbled into redemption like they were looking for something else at the time, people who have just a wee bit of a drinking problem and manage to get sober and help others to do the same, people who are as kind as they are horrible."

I attended the funeral of a colleague once, an older minister who was overcome with illness, and often smelled of stale pipe tobacco. Turns out that smoking was one thing that gave him pleasure and eased the pain in his body, but still he was unpleasant to be around, and had a difficult personality at best. During the eulogy, the retired head of Eden Seminary got up and said a whole host of nice things about the man, remembering his gifts in ministry, his skills and accomplishments that preceded his illness, celebrating him as a saint of God and a minister of the Gospel. This was someone I had begun to look for ways to avoid, yet he was being remembered for the ways God had used him in his 50+ years of ministry. I realized I had been looking at this person with my own failed human vision, not seeing him as a beloved, faithful child of God, who was doing the best that he could in a difficult and challenging situation, living with a painful illness.

There's a saying that I've been trying more and more to take to heart. "Everyone you meet is fighting a battle you know nothing about. So, be kind." More and more, when I encounter someone with whom I disagree, or find difficult or unpleasant, I try to remember this fact. Life is hard, and this person is likely going through a difficult time. More and more, we are reminded that all the saints are also sinners. What matters most is that we leave room for growth, that we try to understand, that we remember in the face of challenges and adversity to be thankful, to be present, to be open to what God is doing in the world, and in our lives.

More than anything, I want to be awake this November to the presence of the light and love of God in the world. I don't want to take even a moment for granted, or to assume that pain, brokenness, and disease has the last word. As we pause to remember the saints who have died, as we gather with our families around Thanksgiving meals, as we meet people coming and going in our lives may we be ever aware of that which gives life, the one who works for liberty, who makes peace, who strives for a more just and kind world, and let us strive to follow that example. When we fall short, let us be reminded that God is not through with us, that every disappointment, every challenging reality can be a source of growth, an opportunity to embrace life and love yet again. Whatever comes, let us remember to be thankful, because it's all a gift.

In the week before Thanksgiving, a teacher asked her class of 9-year-olds to write a paragraph entitled: "What am I most thankful for on Thanksgiving Day." One of the students wrote, "I am thankful that I'm not a turkey at Thanksgiving." When I think about that question, I believe I would answer in the same way. There are also many other things in my life for which I am eternally grateful for. Since November is the month of Thanksgiving and Thanksgiving is the holiday in which we give thanks; I thought I would share some of the things that I am grateful for.

On September 2, 2014, I began my position at David's Church as your Associate Pastor. I am so thankful that I get to spend my days serving as one of your ministers. It is hard to believe that I am already in my second year. Since starting at David's, I have learned that life in full time ministry is anything but predictable. But even through the sometimes chaotic times; I have felt a peace that passes all understanding. I know, in my heart, that I am right where I belong and for that I am so grateful.

Friedrich Nietzsche said that "there is innocence in admiration: it occurs in one who has not yet realized that they might one day be admired." I am grateful to be working alongside Pastor Brian; I truly admire him. I have learned so much from him already throughout my short time here at David's. He has shown me what radical faith looks like and I admire him for his strength and perseverance. Even when facing cancer, he has demonstrated a strong spirit and I continue to be moved every Sunday by his thought-provoking sermons. It is

so evident to me just how much he loves doing what he does, and I find his passion for preaching to be very inspirational. If I can turn out to be half as good of a pastor as he is, I will consider myself lucky.

One of the many reasons that I am grateful to be serving at David's is because of all the wonderful people that attend the church. David's Church is overflowing with such kind and thoughtful individuals. It has been a tremendous privilege to get to know all of you better throughout my time at the church so far. I have also fallen in love with leading Confirmation. It has been a complete joy to form lasting relationships with some of our youth at David's. I simply love everyone here at church and I count my lucky stars all the time that I get to be your Associate Pastor.

Now that I have mentioned some of the things I am thankful for; allow me to mention some of the things that we can all look forward to in this upcoming month. ## **From The Music Department**

This fall season has been so beautiful with the array of color God has provided us if we but look around. I was astounded by the gold blanket of leaves completely covering a neighbor's yard as I passed. I thought to myself that blanket will soon be white with snow, not leaves. How the changes of seasons reflect God's glory!

David's Church now has a lovely traditional ministry in our celebration of Christ's birth through music, our Christmas cantata. We have had a marvelous growth in the choir, but we are in need of additional singers that could sing for the cantata. I warmly welcome anyone who would like to join us. We meet at 7:00 Thursday nights, and our practice will begin with work on the cantata, so that those who are just participating in it can leave before we practice the coming Sundays' anthems.

This year I have chosen "The Silence and the Sound," by Heather Sorensen. The carol "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence," is the anchor for the work which utilizes several traditional carols. She has written a simple lullaby for one of the most poignant moments in the work called "Sleeping Adonai." Adonai is the Hebrew word for God. We can almost sense what it would have been like to have been present at His birth. "Shout! Sing Hallelujah," is the "Sound" moment in the work, and is contrastingly energetic and joyful! The cantata concludes by incorporating "O Worship the King," "What Child is This?" and a reprisal of "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence."

We will continue to offer two services when the cantata is presented on Sunday, December 13<sup>th</sup> at the 9:50 service, and then again at a 2:00 offering. We are once again blessed to have the Springboro High School Orchestra led by Kirby Cain who has graciously agreed to prepare the students joining us. In addition we are making use of the gifts we have in our own congregation. Andy Randall, Terry and Mary Foster, and John Newcomb will be joining to play in the orchestra! I intend on employing the gifts of our youth as well in a piece called "Angels Sing." By youth I mean anyone who has not graduated from high school. We will meet on Sundays immediately following the second service downstairs in the choir/bell room. I want to give everyone a chance to sing with us. Please invite friends and family to come to either service. The second one will mainly be the presentation of the work with some carol singing, rather than a full service. We are hoping to attract people who are engaged in their own services on Sunday morning, but could come in the afternoon!

Handbells are so much darn fun! We laugh as much as we play bells. We have some characters in that choir! We are going to be providing the accompaniment for two of the upcoming anthems that the choir is singing. "Amazing Grace / My Chains are Gone" and "Surely the Presence of the Lord is in This Place," are the two works played in October and November respectively. We would still like additional ringers to complete our five octave set. Sometimes we have to let certain bells in the music remain unring as we only have a set number of hands willing to ring God's praises. Wouldn't a full complement of ringers have even more fun? Just saying!

The children's choir is off to a great start. Our congregation appreciates the service of our children. It helps them become servants to Christ at a young age which can then carry over to adulthood. They can only participate if we, as adults, make this a priority for them. Let's be the example we want our children to see!

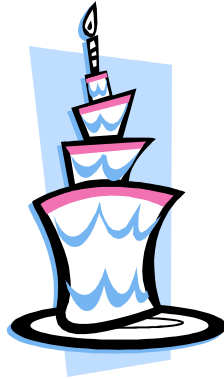
