

From the Pastor's Desk...

Shortly after the New Year begins, I will turn 55. I keep thinking that I'm surely not that old, but then I do the math again and, like it or not, it appears to be true. As always, getting older surely beats the alternative, but that doesn't necessarily make it any easier. I know folk who think 55 means middle age, but I'm doubtful that that is true as I've met very few people who are 110 years old.

So clearly, I've reached that part of life which some consider the back half. This is where you insert the joke about picking up speed because you're over the hill and going down the back side, if you're the kind of person who can make jokes about the meaning of one's life and one's mortality. Not all of us can, or want to, I'm sure.

But like G.K. Chesterton, who once said "it is a test of a good religion whether you can joke about it," I'm convinced that the more important we say that something is, the more we should value it and test it with sensible good humor. That's why the best comics and comedians get their funniest material from everyday life – from family, and love & romance, from politics & religion, from our human similarities and differences. These things are not funny in spite of how important they are, rather because they are so very important to us, they can be really, very funny.

And the way we tell a joke—whether its punch-line says in essence, "this we all have in common," or whether it seeks to make one feel better about oneself by denigrating another who is different—often says more about us than it does about life itself. Our humor either embraces the difficulties and painful realities, the questions and uncertainties of human existence, and sets us free to grow and learn and embrace the unknown, or it becomes a wall we use to protect ourselves, to keep out that which would challenge us and invite us on a journey of greater understanding and compassion.

In his book "Falling Upward; A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life," Franciscan priest Richard Rohr writes that "None of us go into our spiritual maturity completely of our own accord... (elsewhere he writes: The human ego prefers anything, just about anything, to falling or changing or dying). We are led by *Mystery*, which religious people call grace."

He warns us that "the familiar and habitual are so falsely reassuring, and most of us make our homes there permanently. The new is always by definition unfamiliar and untested, so God, life, destiny, suffering have to give us a push – usually a big one – or we will not go."

Which brings us to one of life's greatest ironies: Just as life is too serious not to laugh about, the work and activities of our lives are so very important that we probably need to address them with more playfulness. Rohr reminds us that "We grow spiritually much more by doing it wrong than by doing it right." Or, as Elbert Hubbard wrote, "Constant effort and frequent mistakes are the stepping stones of genius."

Another monk, Thomas Merton also wrote that we may spend our whole life climbing the ladder of success only to find when we get to the top that our ladder is leaning against the wrong wall. There are things we can know, things we have learned to be true, but there is even more that we cannot not know, much of life is beyond our control, and part of playing a meaningful role in life (notice the word "playing") means admitting our limitations, but not allowing them to limit what we're willing to try or do.

Recently, at a Church Vitality workshop I attended the leader suggested that the fear of making mistakes, the fear of failure, can keep us from doing the thing that needs to be done, from learning the things we need to know to not only survive but to thrive. He said, if you've not made at least a half a dozen blunders or big mistakes in the last year, there's a really good chance you're not doing the kind of work that will make a difference, or help achieve a better outcome. This is the essence of living by faith, Rohr insists, trusting God and going to the new place God has promised to show us, much like Sarah and Abraham. Isaiah calls God's people to always be on the look out for the "new thing" that God is going to do, and at the beginning of a New Year that's something we might want to think about.

In a fine essay at Huffington Post on "Science, Religion & Religious Minimalism," Philip Clayton writes that we can live in a complex, pluralistic world where new information often creates more questions than answers, and the old paradigms are dissolving before our eyes before new, proven practices have been established. He writes: "And we are all outsiders. All of us, no matter what we believe, stand outside traditions to which the vast majority of other human beings belong.

"The lesson to draw from this inescapable fact of the human condition is the need for a profound humility about one's own beliefs, especially when they are the kinds of beliefs that one cannot fully test in the company of others... those whose religious experiences and values give rise to inescapably Christian convictions (best) become Christian minimalists when they learn to hold their beliefs with humility and a certain lightness of touch."

So, together we start a new year filled with the unknown and uncertainties at every turn. Rohr suggests that we cannot afford to hold off on living life, or wait to act until we have a proven path or a perfect game plan that guarantees the desired results. In fact, he writes that "demand for the perfect is the greatest enemy of the good." In other words, we have to get busy living, get busy growing and loving.

We fail ourselves most, when we don't engage, when we don't try, when we hold on to the past so grimly that we miss the bright moment of possibility right before us in the present. When Jesus warned his friends about putting new

wine in an old wine skin, he was advising us not to miss the “new thing” that God is doing and the promise of the future by mourning that it won’t look like we want it to, or that it doesn’t fit the form that worked back ten or twenty years ago, or even yesterday.

So, David’s enters its 186th year of ministry, a progressive Christian community where faith comes to life. And, me, I’m entering my 56th year, sure of all that I have learned thus far on the journey, but still with curiosity and questions. As suggested, I will strive to hold onto my beliefs, even my core values, with humility and a certain lightness of touch. But, since time is short and this moment is important, I’ll also take a few risks, try some new practices, learn more about life if I can, and make mistakes of course. Perhaps, you’re willing to join me on the journey.

At the end of life, I don’t want to be overwhelmed with regret that I limited God and myself and God’s church by thinking too small, afraid or worried about what others might think. So, I’ll enter again the adventure, for as Rohr writes: “great love is always a discovery, a revelation, a wonderful surprise, a falling into ‘something’ much bigger and deeper that is literally beyond us and larger than us.” I don’t want to miss out on that, by choosing to sit on the sidelines. Do you?

Notes from Rev. Daria

A new year, a fresh start! I always love this time of year, when things slow down after the holidays and there is time for contemplation and new projects. For me contemplation can take the form of serious formal prayer or it can come as I allow myself to become deeply absorbed in snipping paper snowflakes to adorn my windows or tinkering with a spicy hot cocoa recipe and a batch of marshmallows made from scratch. I hope you create some room in your life for playful contemplation in 2012!

A good way for women to do that is to join in the fun of the new women’s spirituality group that we are forming. If you missed the first meeting, the idea-sharing led to a shape for the group that will include a monthly meeting (the last Monday of each month) which will include discussion of a book and reflection on personal Sabbath practice. Each member is asked to complete the reading for the month and also to commit to a Sabbath practice in which you will engage for at least an hour each week. This can be a traditional spiritual practice such as contemplative prayer or devotional Bible reading, but can also be something which might be as seemingly frivolous as baking bread, coloring in a coloring book, or setting aside time to see a movie, have lunch with a dear friend, or visit a museum. Any life-giving activity which is done with the potential of allowing more room for God in your life fits the bill. I am committing to setting aside an hour each week to play with some kind of art form. In 2012, we’ll journey together through *Simple Abundance: a Daybook of Comfort and Joy* by Sarah Ban Breathnach. This is a daily reading (sometimes with homework, but it’s fun homework!), so if you would like to participate, get a copy and start reading, then choose some kind of Sabbath practice to which you feel you can commit an hour each week. Come to the Conference Room at 6:30 p.m. on January 30th prepared to share your experience! Friends of all spiritual identities are welcome.

Women interested in a more cerebral approach to faith exploration are invited to be part of the ongoing DVD study on the biblical heroine, Judith, in which Women Exploring Faith is engaged this year. We’ll meet in the Conference Room at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, January 11th. All women are invited to join the discussion!

Another new group will continue in January. When the Spiritual Parenting Group met for the first time in November, I had planned to give everyone the month of December off since folks tend to be busy. However, the group responded as one, “Yes, we’re busy, but we *need* this group!” So, our January meeting will be our third meeting, but there is still plenty of room for more members! If you need this group, too, join us in the Conference Room at 4 p.m. on January 8th. We will be discussing Principle 2 (Trust & Teach that All Life Is Connected and Has a Purpose) in Mimi Doe’s *10 Principles for Spiritual Parenting*. Child care will be provided. Right after the Spiritual Parenting Group, at 5 p.m. on Sunday, January 8th, Family@5 will meet in Fellowship Hall for a potluck dinner and activities celebrating the joy of snow! You won’t need to dress warmly for this snow party, but we may find a day to go sledding together, so keep an eye on the bulletin and the Family@5 Facebook group for more info about that!

David’s Youth (grades 6-12) will also be engaging in some snowy fun, if the weather cooperates! We’ll get lunch at Chipotle, then go sledding after the annual meeting on January 29th, so bring your favorite sled and some lunch money! Friends are welcome, but *must* have completed permission forms to go with us. If there is no snow, we’ll have lunch & go to the movies. Friends are also welcome to join us for the January 16th Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial March and Rally, a celebration of the life and work of King and a recognition that we are called to continue his work. Traditionally, people marching from the south begin at the Fairgrounds at 11 a.m., but I haven’t seen the schedule for 2012, so look for more details coming soon! If you’re interested in chaperoning either of these activities, let me know!

If you think people who go out into the snow on purpose are nuts and you just want to visit with me in a cozy, welcoming environment, I'd love to see you at Coffee Shop Hours. I will be camped out by the fire every Wednesday in January from 3-5 p.m. at the downtown Centerville Panera.

How We Came to the Covenant of Welcome

David's Church has spent over nine months exploring whether to become an Open and Affirming church and if so, how to frame that commitment. This effort has involved events and programming overseen by the Elders and hosted by Adult Education, as well as opportunities for the congregation to contribute to the language of an evolving *Covenant of Welcome*.

This work by the congregation resulted in a proposed *Covenant of Welcome* that came before Council on December 20, 2011. It was unanimously approved and is reproduced below. The process is not complete, however. A January 22 meeting of the congregation in Fellowship Hall following worship will provide opportunity to give final comments, pro or con, on the Council- approved document and the process leading to its approval. Comments can either be personal or a summary of discussions at individual tables. Notes from the meeting will be documented and submitted to Elders and Council.

The process will culminate at the Annual Meeting on January 29, 2012 when there will be a vote by the membership on a motion to accept the *Covenant of Welcome* as approved by Council. Voting will be by written ballot with Yes or No options. A majority is necessary for the motion to carry.

Covenant of Welcome to David's United Church of Christ, Kettering Ohio

As exemplified by the life and teachings of Jesus Christ, the congregation of David's Church welcomes and affirms the worth of all people. At David's Church we strive to be an inclusive and liberating congregation where **all** people can be their true selves and feel safe and free. We celebrate God's unconditional acceptance of every individual and Jesus' commandment to love one another.

Therefore, we invite, embrace and support:

- those of all ages and household compositions
- those who are conventional Christians, questioning skeptics, or somewhere between
- those of all cultures and ethnicities
- those of all mental and physical abilities
- those of all political and theological backgrounds and beliefs
- those of all sexual orientations and gender identities
- those alienated, rejected, oppressed or imprisoned by society
- those of all socioeconomic conditions
- those who have lost hope and those who hope for a better world

to participate fully in the life, leadership, ministry, fellowship, worship, sacraments, responsibilities, blessings, sorrows and joys of our church family.

This *Covenant of Welcome* was approved unanimously by Council on December 20, 2011.

From The Board of Deacons

On December 5th, the president, treasurer and board chairs met to trim the budget due to a projected shortfall. At that meeting \$11,000 was trimmed from the proposed 2012 budget. A week later a letter from the Board of Deacons was sent to you indicating the need for an additional pledge of \$200 (\$4/ week) per family to meet this projected shortfall. To date of this writing we have received 7 slips of paper back with an additional amount of \$2000. While this is a start it needs to be much more. I know this is the busiest time of the year, but the work of David's Church continues all year long, no time off for good behavior or holidays. Please prayerfully consider returning the slip of paper from the letter with an additional pledge to bridge the budget shortfall and support the ministry, staff, music, Christian education, and mission work of this church.

Call to Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 29

The Annual Congregational Meeting of David's United Church of Christ will be held on Sunday, January 29, following the 9:50 a.m. service, hopefully starting by 11:15. This is our regular meeting where staff and boards report, and we elect new members to boards and the Church Council, and vote to accept the 2012 budget. In addition, there are two other big items coming up for a vote this year, proposed revisions to our Congregation's Constitution and By-laws, and the Welcome Covenant statement (printed elsewhere in the Dateline) that has come together as a result of our year long conversation about becoming an officially Open & Affirming congregation of the UCC. Because discussion of any of the three – the Budget, the Constitution revisions or the proposed ONA welcome statement – could make the meeting exceptionally long, we hope that folk interested in a deeper understanding or discussion of the issues and changes suggested attend one of two meetings prior to the Congregational Meeting. On Jan. 8, during second hour (11:15 or so), there will be a meeting to go over the final proposed budget for 2012, and the suggested changes to the Constitution and Bylaws. On Jan. 22, also during second hour, we will gather for a final forum on the decision of David's Church to become an Official Open & Affirming Congregation of the UCC, and the proposed Welcome Covenant Statement. While we don't want to limit discussion on any of these three or other issues before the Congregation, we hope that interested members will be sure to attend these forums to get answers to questions and offer opinions so that our Congregational meeting can be a more concise and effective gathering.




David's Pictorial Directory
