**From the Pastor's Desk...**

They tell me that Thanksgiving is late this year, but it doesn't feel that way. But that was the excuse I've been given from several people to explain why there are so many Christmas decorations up so early. In many stores and businesses, it appears that folk started putting up Christmas trees and other decorations immediately after Halloween. My wife, Susie, said that driving through our neighborhood on her way home from work that many of our neighbors have already put up their Christmas trees, and other decorations. No doubt, we too will soon have some decorations up, as we have family visiting for Thanksgiving and it may be time to give Christmas gifts to our grandsons, since we won't see them again for a while.

The thing is, some of our more conservative Christian friends and some in the media have returned to their traditional talking point that there's some kind of a "War on Christmas," and some folk are saying things like, "Now, we can say 'Merry Christmas' again," as if there's ever been any real persecution for Christians in North America celebrating what has become one of the most commercialized and financially-focused season in the American economy. So, to be clear, what I'm saying is that these two things cannot both be true. We can't have stock market analysts reporting about whether the "Christmas gift giving season" has proven as beneficial to the economic interests of our nation and still believe for a moment any argument that says people are being hurt by the fact that when they were leaving some department store the security person wished them "Season's Greetings" or "Happy Holidays." In this country, Christmas music and decorations are ubiquitous in public life from Thanksgiving on, and this year especially it appears to be creeping up on Halloween.

Any day now, I'm going to get a Christmas card from a member of my family that says, "Put Christ back into Christmas," or something close to that message. And I certainly understand the point of this sentiment, although it used to be something people said because they were offended that some folk tend to abbreviate "Christmas" down to "Xmas." This has always been amusing to me, because although I was never a great student of New Testament Greek (Honest, I tried my best, and for those who are counting, it's "Koine" or the common Greek of everyday people at that time), I did learn in that class that many Christians came to use the letter "X" in their alphabet, which is pronounced "Chi" or "Kai" to refer to Christ quite naturally as it's in the first letter in the Greek word. Thus, one of the ways that early Christians chose to signify the concept of the "Christ" was with the combined letters "Chi – Rho." Because of that early awareness during my seminary studies, in most of my notebooks and often when writing by hand, I have used the "X" to represent Christ, and "Xian" to refer to Christians, as a sort of shorthand. Something you do when quickly taking notes in a class.

Similarly, when writing notes, I never spell out the word "theology," I always cheat and use the Greek letter "theta." And, that sadly, is the extent of my current knowledge after taking 4 semesters of New Testament Greek back in the day. Gladly, I believe I've retained a fair amount of the content from other studies, I'm just not good with foreign languages.

That said, I take little offense at the odd "Merry Xmas" card that comes, I'm more shocked that people are still sending Christmas cards in the mail with actual stamps. And to be honest, while I certainly understand and nod in agreement with Charlie Brown when he is resistant to the vast commercialization of what Linus reminds us by quoting from Luke's Gospel is the story of "our dear Savior's birth," I find the general hoopla of our yearly Christmas rituals – with all the decorations, the parties and gifts, the shopping and food and extravagance – comforting in a meaningful way.

Of course, we've all encountered the odd Scrooge or Grinch here and there, but generally people tend to be of good cheer during the holidays. It feels special to me that we shop for each other and give gifts that we hope are the right size, that please the recipient, and gives them a sense of joy and appreciation. It's lovely that we push back against the darkness and cold of the beginning of winter with extra lights, and special events, and frankly, it's sweet that, generally speaking, people are a bit more jolly, kind, and festive this time of year. Sure, they're just being good to please Santa and rake in the goodies, a cynical person might think, but hey, I just like the result as folk tend to be a bit more gracious with one another while sorting out their holiday challenges.

What I'm saying is, Christmas comes at us each year with all kinds of baggage, some of it unfortunate and challenging, but mostly, at this point in my life I'm quite happy to go along for the ride. Of course, we've outgrown the stage where we are trying to please children who have been overwhelmed by the constant barrage of television commercials and other messages that put pressure on parents to try and make this day extra special, and that can mean spending more money than one can really afford. I get that pressure which can overwhelm parents these days, but I know in my heart that more than all the gifts and glitter, what children really want and need from us is our presence, our interest and concern, our support and care.

Finally, the message I want to share with all of you, my dear friends, is that our celebrations of the birth of the Christ child should have some resemblance to what we have learned about who that child grows to be as an adult. Someone who walks closely with God, and lives compassionately in the world, with and for people. I've seen those memes about "Keeping Christ in Christmas,"



and they often come with a great list of behaviors and values that we might benefit from emulating as we move through this festive season. “Feed the hungry, comfort the afflicted, love the outcast, forgive others, inspire the hopeless,” says one meme. Another adds, “clothe the naked, welcome the unwanted, care for the ill, embrace outsiders, share with those in need.” Of course, the actual list isn’t important, the point is that we should remind ourselves about how Jesus lived and loved, the values that he embodied as he walked through the world, the lessons he taught in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5 – 7; Luke 6: 17ff.) and elsewhere.

Turns out, that lots of people claim Jesus, either for their specific church, or favorite theology, and some even attach “being Christian” to voting for one political party or the other. People sometimes debate how Jesus would live here as we enter the 2020’s, some want to say Jesus would vote this way or that, others insist Jesus would drive this kind of car or act or dress a certain way. All of that speculation and debate can make for some interesting conversations, but the side we take in any of those conversations is likely to reveal more about us and what we care about, than it does anything about Jesus. Truth be told, we do have one primary point of connection: The Jesus we encounter in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

That’s why I think it’s important that we gather regularly to read the texts and talk about them, together, to remind ourselves who we are as followers of Jesus, and whose we are. In the day to day busyness of life, we often forget, and can easily forget what truly matters most. It’s nice to come together each Sunday and sing a few songs, share some thoughts and ideas, and touch base with what is real and important, and be reminded what Jesus reveals about God’s love and justice.

One of the great things about being a part of a church community, in my humble opinion, is that we don’t have to start from scratch, we don’t have to figure life out all by our lonesome, that we don’t have to go it alone when life gets hard and confusing. And, we don’t have to find ways that make for a better world, and a more meaningful way to live in isolation. We have the benefit of a faith tradition, and generations of folk who have gone before us who have plenty of wisdom and stories to share. And, more importantly, we have each other to bounce our questions and concerns off, and to combine our efforts to make a meaningful impact on the needy world around us. I don’t know where to start on my own to “feed the hungry…” and all that. But here at David’s Church, there have been opportunities to donate food to feed folk at the homeless shelter, to bring peanut butter to feed hungry school children, make cookies for shut-in folk to leave with them when we go and sing Christmas carols for and with them, and there were those Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner baskets given to folk

in the community, lots of great ways to do and be good in the world.

I didn’t have to think very hard to come up with ways to do what I know is important and valuable, because I’m part of a community that’s prioritizing that very thing, and I’m able to join my small gift with the small gifts of others and see how together we can make a big difference. Same goes with “comforting the afflicted,” and “loving the outcast,” we can take on these things as a congregation and have a bigger impact by participating as a whole. So, let’s dive in to Advent together, let us look for the new thing that God is going to do in our midst, let’s not miss out on the good and lovely things that happen when we meet together and keep Christ at the center of our lives by Being the Church.

## Notes from Rev. Michelle

Back in August, I received the news that I had been accepted into the Kettering Leadership Academy. This is a nine-month program and is designed for citizens to learn about every major aspect of community life through presentations, discussions and direct experience. The learning experiences I will get to have will include classes covering topics such as public safety, city government, education/schools, community diversity, health care, business, history and service clubs/volunteering. I will get to work with my fellow class members on a class project and I am tasked with attending a wide variety of different board meetings. Through all of these different opportunities, I will come to know the city where I serve a lot better.

This program is set up in a similar fashion to my Next Generation Leadership Initiative. I am learning alongside a group of different leaders who work in the Kettering area. We grew closer as we participated in a wide variety of team building activities at Camp Joy. Here is a picture of our group at our opening retreat at Camp Joy.

I am a few months into this program and I have already learned so much about the wonderful



city of Kettering. In September, we had our opening retreat and then in October our first full day session was centered on the Kettering city government. On that day, we got a personal tour of Kettering and we got to meet

and hear from many government employees. In November, our focus was on education and schools and we had the honor of meeting and hearing from many people who serve in different capacities on the school board and work for Kettering City Schools. We also got to take a tour of Fairmont High School and we got to learn more about a student led group called Hope Squad.

Hope Squad is comprised of 50 student leaders who are there to uplift other students around them. They give out compliments and are ready to listen and even respond if and when there is a crisis. During our tour of the school, we got to meet with several of these student leaders and hear more about this program. Hope Squad is a school-based peer-to-peer, suicide prevention program for students. Members are students nominated by peers as trustworthy classmates and are trained to identify at-risk students, provide friendship and seek help from an adult.

I am truly inspired by these students who are taking the time to spread a message of kindness and love. This group lives up to its name, I believe, they are spreading hope in their school and in each other's lives. Desmond Tutu once said that "hope is being able to see that there is light despite all of the darkness." I believe this group of students from Kettering who form the "Hope Squad" are actively being a light in the darkness. And speaking of being a light in the darkness, let's talk about the story of Jesus' birth.

It is hard to believe that it is that time of year again, that special time when we remember and celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan have this to say about the season of Advent: "Christmas is about the coming in the present of the Lord who came long ago in the past. Jesus comes again each Christmas. This is the central purpose of the season of the church year known as Advent, the four Sundays and four weeks before Christmas. Each Advent, Christian relive ancient Israel's yearning and hope, and each Christmas Christians celebrate the fulfillment of that yearning: Joy to the World- the Lord is come. The purpose of Advent and Christmas is to bring the past into the present."

I liked what Crossan and Borg had to say about Christmas being about light coming into the darkness. They write: "Christmas is about light coming into the darkness of our individual lives, about our return from exile, about inner peace. Indeed, it is about the birth of Christ within us. In the 13<sup>th</sup> century, Meister Eckhart preached about Christmas as the birth of Christ within us through the union of God's Spirit with our flesh. So also a line from the familiar 19<sup>th</sup> century hymn "O Little Town of Bethlehem" affirms the personal meaning; "O holy child of Bethlehem...be born in us today.""

The message of Christmas is one that gives me continued hope because it shows us a God who cares, a God who cares so much for God's people that God

comes down and becomes one of us. God enters into our messy world and experiences all that comes with being a human. And I love that God doesn't enter into our world in some grand and majestic way, God enters in the most humble way possible. God is born in a smelly manger surrounded by stinky animals.

My faith rests on the belief that God is with us now and always. The story of Jesus' birth illustrates just how far God is willing to go to show us just how much God loves us. God loves us enough to move into our neighborhood and become one of us and suffer like one of us and die like one of us. For me, this gives me great hope and it is for me a light in the darkness.

I believe this Advent and Christmas season; we can learn a lot from the students at Fairmont High School who are a part of Hope Squad. These students are being a light in the darkness and are spreading hope in a seemingly hopeless world. As we enter into this season, how can we be a light in the darkness and how can we join the students in spreading hope in our world?

May everyone have a wonderful Holiday Season!

## **“A Festival of Lessons and Carols” by Hal Hopson December 15, 9:50 a.m. & 2:00 p.m. (with 8:30 worship in the Chapel)**

In lieu of our regular Christmas cantata, this year the choir will be performing “A Festival of Lessons and Carols” by Hal Hopson. Lessons and Carols had its origin at Truro Cathedral in England. It began on Christmas Eve when a service of scripture and supporting carols was developed by the Bishop of Truro. It was quickly duplicated by cathedrals and churches throughout the world. The heart of the service continues to this day – the retelling of the Christmas story of faith from the fall of Adam to the coming of the Word Incarnate.

The work is unlike the cantatas in the instrumentation as well. We will use a double string quartet, handbells, percussion, and organ. This will have a different sort of sound than we have been hearing in the cantatas – no brass or woodwinds. My hope is that the simplifying of the instrumentation will allow the clarity of the text to be greater. There will even be a Carol Prelude that is entirely instrumental. There are nine lessons interspersed with prayers and a musical selection.

Some of the pieces are very sparse as far as instrumentation like the one after the first lesson – “God Walked in Eden’s Garden Fair.” The only accompaniment is handbells which play chord clusters while the choir then sings phrases that sound very much like plainsong. Some lesser known carols have been utilized and adapted for this work. To feature the inherent beauty of both male and female voices, one carol is provided for SSA (Soprano, 2<sup>nd</sup> Soprano, and Alto) and one for TB (Tenor and Bass). The congregation will be joining in much more than they have in the past. My intention is that having sung carols together, our hearts will be more prepared for Christ’s birth.

As in the past, there are going to be two performances of the Lessons and Carols. The first is at our 9:50 worship service on the 15<sup>th</sup> of December. The other one is later that afternoon at 2:00. We are excited to share the gospel story this way. We hope to see you there – bring a friend or two!

## **Longest Night of the Year (Blue Christmas) Service Sunday, December 22, 7:00 PM in the Chapel**

Amid the vast commercialization and the spirits of forced joy that often accompany many of the expectations of Christmas, many of us find it a challenging, even a difficult holiday season. For some it’s the external circumstances around welcoming the birth of the one called the “Prince of Peace” while the world around us is distressed by war, poverty, hunger and disease. For others it’s a more personal dis-ease, sometimes due to grief at the loss of loved ones, financial or employment concerns, distance from family and friends, or outright loneliness. Many of us need a place to honestly express our longing for wholeness, to acknowledge our real feelings of disappointment and sadness, before we can move into the Christmas spirit of joyful expectation and hope for better days in the New Year. So, we gather close to the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year, to remember the prophet Isaiah’s word that “the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.” Indeed, the Christmas story speaks of God come to dwell among us, to embrace all that comes in the human condition. We’ll light candles to push back the darkness, offer prayers for healing, and hear the word of hope that comes in the birth of love in our midst.



### Christmas Eve Offering

Your Mission Board is asking for your support for a special Christmas Eve Offering. This contribution will be divided evenly in four ways:

Most of the young people have been in abusive situations and need loving, skilled care to recover and get on with their lives. 3. *The Christmas Fund for Veterans of the Cross* provides assistance for retired UCC clergy and their families when the need arises. The assistance is appreciated in the form of a Christmas gift check, a health insurance subsidy, or as an emergency grant.
4. *David's UCC* will use this support to help meet the church's 2019 Operating Budget.

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## **Pastoral & Staff Relations Committee (PSRC)**

David's Pastoral & Staff Relations Committee (PSRC) is a standing committee of our church that seeks to support and maintain an open and healthy relationship between the pastors, staff, and members of the congregation. PSRC serves in two main ways: 1) as an advisory group to the pastors and music director, and 2) as support for their leadership. As an advisory group, the PSRC shares with the pastors and music director ideas, hope/dreams, expectations, and concerns of the congregation. As support for the pastors and music director, PSRC interprets their roles, functions, and needs to the congregation.

David's PSRC operates as an independent group separate from Elders and the Personnel Committee. Because the effectiveness of the PSRC rests heavily upon trust built and maintained between the pastors, music director, and the Committee, members pledge to maintain strict confidentiality concerning the content of the meetings and discussions.
